


Rue Randall Clifford (right)



Local teacher Rue Randall Clifford heard about the Carnegie grant program and rode through town on horseback gathering signatures to show public interest in establishing a library.

1916: South San Francisco is awarded a Carnegie grant to build the library. The town is required to provide land for the building and fund ongoing staffing, books and supplies costs. Mrs. Caroline Coffinberry is hired as the first librarian. A Library Board of Trustees is created, and the City Council gives \$200 to purchase books.

1917: The Grand Avenue library opens as a free public library on August 15.











Halley's Comet ibrary

The South San Francisco Public Library will get Halley's Comet off to a lying start Dec. 2 when a top astronomer visits the library for a free program.

Andrew Fraknoi, executive officer of the Astronomical Society of the Pacific and a part-time professor of astronomy and physics at San Francisco State University, will be the guest lecturer in the program entitled, Return of Halley's Comet."

The program, free but with a reservation required, will begin at :30 p.m. in the lower level auditorium at the West Orange Avenue Library branch, 840 W. Orange Ave. To reserve a seat, visit the library and secure a

Halley's Comet, during its return late this year and early 1986, is a once-in- every-76-years occurrence. It is expected to be quite dim and may be difficult to see from most urban area of the United States.

Fraknoi also is editor of the magazine, Mercury, published by the Astronomical Society and is the author of three books and numerous articles on astronomy


education and interdisciplinary approaches to astronomy.


From 1982 to 1984 he was host of "Exploring the Universe," a two-hour weekly talk show on KGO-FM, San Francisco.

The library program will include instructions to help locate the


comet as well as an introductory discussion about comet science and lore, a preview of the spacecraft missions meeting the comet and a general introduction to astronomy as a hobby.

The library also will have displays on Halley's Comet.
